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Nan Goldin to debut major new work at the Southbank Centre's Hayward Gallery

24 November 2026 - 7 March 2027

Today, the Hayward Gallery announces further details of its major solo exhibition by acclaimed American artist and activist Nan Goldin, rounding off the Southbank Centre's 75th anniversary year. Marking Goldin's first institutional show in the UK since 2002, the presentation will debut a new film alongside other recent moving image works and photographs, offering a rare insight into how we can survive, empathise and find beauty in uncertain times.

Over the past five decades, Goldin has documented personal relationships, addiction and queer communities. Her unflinching images transformed photography by closing the distance between the observer and the observed, capturing the rawness of her own life. Comprising deeply

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intimate photographs and slideshows, her stories embrace the complexity of life as universal tales of love and loss.

Visitors will see new and recent films in spaces specially designed with architect Hala Wardé to convey the mood of each piece. Marking its public debut, ***You Never Did Anything Wrong, Part II*** (2026) will screen alongside ***You Never Did Anything Wrong, Part I*** (2024). Both films mark a striking new direction as Goldin shifts her focus away from humans and towards other species.

Shot on 16mm film, ***Part I*** is centred around a solar eclipse. The film is inspired by an ancient myth of animals stealing the sun. Shifting into a world entirely without humans, the work shows the full range of animal consciousness. Featuring music by Valerij Fedorenko and an original score by Mica Levi, ***Part I*** is dedicated to Sulala Animal Rescue: the oldest animal rescue in the Gaza Strip whom Goldin has worked with closely.

Created in close collaboration with filmmaker David Sherman, ***Part II*** is an abstract film comprising found footage, damaged soundtracks from old films and a new score by Mica Levi. The source material is old 16mm films - mostly nature documentaries from the 1960s and 70s when Goldin was growing up - which reflect the ways we were taught to view other species. The film then expands into a lyrical ode to the land, the animals and the minutiae of the natural world, remaining abstract while imbued with a deep sense of impending extinction.

The exhibition will also mark the UK premiere of ***Stendhal Syndrome*** (2024), which contrasts photographs of Goldin's friends and lovers with classical art from museums around the world, revealing uncanny resemblances in composition, colour and emotion. Accompanied by a score by Soundwalk Collective, the work, in Goldin's words, "*shows that my people have always been here*".

Alongside it, ***Memory Lost*** (2019–2021) explores Goldin's personal history with drugs and the darkness of addiction. Through slides capturing scenes from her own life and friendships, the film shows the ecstasy, mourning and pain of drug use. By connecting personal testimony with structural critique, Goldin advocates for harm reduction and the destigmatisation of drug use. The work is dedicated to P.A.I.N. (Prescription Addiction Intervention Now), the activist group that Goldin started to combat the overdose crisis.

Upstairs, the Hayward Gallery will present a selection of Goldin's photographs, including a new body of photographic prints connected to the *You Never Did Anything Wrong* films.

Altogether, *You Never Did Anything Wrong* celebrates Goldin's enduring commitment to bearing witness: to intimacy, endurance, political struggle and the fragile conditions through which people, animals and the land must exist in the world.

Rachel Thomas, Roden Chief Curator, says: "*We are incredibly proud to debut new work by Nan Goldin at the Hayward Gallery. This exhibition traces the evolution of her gaze through extraordinary new and recent moving image works, demonstrating how her lens operates on a wavelength of pure compassion. Shifting her focus from human relationships to animal*

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consciousness and the natural world, Goldin brilliantly re-evaluates how we perceive other living beings. At a time of deep uncertainty, her work collapses the distance between the observer and the observed, urging us to look at our fragile world with a deeper sense of empathy, wonder and shared survival."

Mark Ball, Southbank Centre's Artistic Director, says: *"Nan Goldin has reshaped the language of photography, transforming the medium into a profound living record of human intimacy and resilience. At the Hayward Gallery, we are thrilled to host her first major UK exhibition for over two decades with work that captures the soul of her practice. To bring her radical vision to our Brutalist spaces in the culmination of our 75th anniversary programme is a moment of immense pride. Nan Goldin's work offers our audiences an encounter with an artist who has never looked away."*

Tickets will go on sale to Southbank Centre Members on **Wednesday 15 July 2026** and to the general public via our [website](#) on **Friday 17 July 2026**. 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About Nan Goldin

Nan Goldin is an American photographer and artist. Since the 1970s her work has explored notions of gender and definitions of normality. By documenting her life and the lives of the friends who surround her, Goldin gives a voice and visibility to her communities especially the bohemian LGBT communities which were deeply impacted by the devastating HIV/AIDS crisis of the 1980s. These images of her “extended family” became the subject of her seminal slide show and first book *The Ballad of Sexual Dependency*. Her retrospective *This Will Not End Well*, the first exhibition dedicated to her work as a filmmaker, traveled through Europe in 2022–2026 (Moderna Museet, Stockholm; Stedelijk Museum, Amsterdam; Neue Nationalgalerie, Berlin; Pirelli HangarBicocca, Milan; and GrandPalaisRmn, Paris). She is the founding member of the advocacy group P.A.I.N. (Prescription Addiction Intervention Now) which targeted the pharmaceutical companies responsible for the overdose epidemic. She has been an outspoken advocate for Palestine since the 1970s. She lives and works in New York City and Paris.

About the Hayward Gallery

The Southbank Centre’s Hayward Gallery is a world-renowned contemporary art gallery and Brutalist landmark. Since its 1968 opening by Queen Elizabeth II, the Gallery has built a legacy of showcasing the world’s most daring and innovative artists, including Anish Kapoor, Bridget Riley, Mike Nelson, Linder, Lee Bul, Tracey Emin and Yoshitomo Nara. Known for its career-defining solo shows and dial-shifting group exhibitions, such as *Dear Earth*, *In The Black Fantastic*, *The Other Story* and *Psycho Buildings*, the Hayward remains a vital platform for established and emerging voices. Designed by a team of young architects including Dennis Crompton, Warren Chalk, and Ron Herron, and named after Sir Isaac Hayward, the gallery invites audiences to experience art in one of the UK’s most unique architectural settings.

About the Southbank Centre

The Southbank Centre is the UK’s largest multi-arts centre and engages the most diverse audiences of any performing arts organisation in the UK.
