The Sunbathers is a sculpture that was first exhibited at Festival of Britain in 1951. When the festival closed the sculpture was lost for 65 years, but the sculpture was found in 2016 in the garden of a hotel. It was quite badly damaged but has now been restored and you can see it up on the wall.

This sculpture was created by Peter Laszlo Peri who made his own concrete
material, which he called 'Pericrete'. If you made your own material, what would


3. The Story of 51
