Southbank Centre announces *futuretense*, a weekly showcase of new music talent

Today, Southbank Centre announces *futuretense*: a high-profile public performance platform presenting the best untapped talent in British and international new music, every Friday, for free.

Launching **Friday 6 September**, *futuretense* runs weekly at 6pm in the newly refurbished Queen Elizabeth Hall Foyer. Attendance is free and no booking is required.

The initiative is part of Southbank Centre's commitment to developing artists and supporting the creative industries. It replaces the previous free gig slot Friday Tonic. It is a hot spot for audiences to discover their next favourite band, an enviable development and showcase opportunity for artists and a regular fixture on the professional A&R circuit, presenting cherry-picked talent each week for agents, promoters, record labels and music publishers to discover future stars.

It is delivered in collaboration with **BBC Music Introducing**, BBC Radio's platform for supporting under-the-radar UK talent, and with Southbank Centre's long-time creative learning partners, the innovative jazz music education and artist development organisation **Tomorrow's Warriors**. Once a month, a BBC Music Introducing act will be selected from their nation-wide roster to play *futuretense*. Every two months, Tomorrow's Warriors will do the same.

Head of Contemporary Music at Southbank Centre, Bengi Ünsal, said:

"As the UK's largest arts centre, we're in a unique position to bring together artists, audience and industry. We have the ecology to support artists at each step of their career, from their first futuretense gig, through performances in Purcell Room, Queen Elizabeth Hall and the 3,000-capacity Royal Festival Hall - all the way to being the next Meltdown curator. And with our enviable location, open doors and programming bringing more than 4.5 million visitors to our site each year, futuretense offers huge potential for the artists we'll showcase.

"Along with the powerhouse teams at Tomorrow's Warriors - whose influence on the London Jazz renaissance cannot be understated - and BBC Music Introducing - the preeminent national platform for new music of all genres - I'm excited to put our name behind some of the incredible new artists coming out of this country and abroad, and to play a part in their success and the future of the industry."

Millie Carter, BBC Music Introducing Production Co-ordinator, said:

"BBC Music Introducing supports unsigned, undiscovered and under the radar music across the UK. With upwards of 500,000 tracks uploaded to the BBC Music Introducing website and over 200,000 artists registered, Introducing provides a network dedicated to supporting the best emerging talent from across the UK. The 36 local Introducing teams have been forwarding artists to perform at futuretense and we are really excited to collaborate with Southbank Centre."

On her experience playing at Southbank Centre, composer and musician **Poppy Ackroyd** said:

"It has always been an ambition to play at Southbank Centre and so far I have performed there as a soloist twice - a free concert in the Foyer, and a full electronic set with visuals in the beautiful new Purcell Room. In both cases I had full support from the venue and technical teams. This support makes all the difference, allowing you to just focus on the music and performance. I can't wait to go back and perform there again in the Queen Elizabeth Hall in November."

6 September 2019, Southbank Centre's Queen Elizabeth Hall Foyer, 5.30pm, free, no ticket required Two top talents from BBC Music Introducing kick off the very first futuretense. Drummer and producer Ajit Gill weaves a progressive, jazz inspired set, flirting with the sounds of hip-hop, electronic soul and all kinds of exotic melody. Ajit will showcase songs from his main project, Vertaal, who have been selling out some of London's biggest jazz venues. Hailing from the West Midlands, Nikita Bassi

demonstrates her self-produced sound - distinctively delicate yet dusky and mixed with an array of world instrumentation which predominantly hints at her Punjabi-Indian heritage.

FUTURETENSE: SINEAD O BRIEN

Her energetic performance features her band and collaborators, Julian Hanson (guitar) and Oscar Robertson (drums).

FUTURETENSE: JOSIN

8 November 2019, Southbank Centre's Queen Elizabeth Hall Foyer, 6pm, free, no ticket required Josin's first EP Epilogue introduced listeners to a soaring, moving and strikingly original fusion of neoclassical textures and inquisitive electronics. Their live shows balance fiery grooves and heavy riffs with cinematic, ethereal soundscapes, performed by five musicians at the forefront of the new wave of Scottish Jazz.

The son of a Congolese master percussionist, Manzanza brings an eclectic style and diverse skill to his craft to create a genre bending experience rooted in jazz and African rhythm.

About Southbank Centre

Southbank Centre is the UK's largest arts centre and one of the UK's top five visitor attractions, occupying a 17 acre site that sits in the midst of London's most vibrant cultural quarter on the South Bank of the Thames. We exist to present great cultural experiences that bring people together and we achieve this by providing the space for artists to create and present their best work and by creating a place where as many people as possible can come together to experience bold, unusual and eye-opening work. The site has an extraordinary creative and architectural history stretching back to the 1951 Festival of Britain. Southbank Centre is made up of the Royal Festival Hall, Queen Elizabeth Hall, Purcell Room

and Hayward Gallery as well as being home to the National Poetry Library and the Arts Council Collection. It is also home to four Resident Orchestras (London Philharmonic Orchestra, Philharmonia Orchestra, London Sinfonietta and Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment) and four Associate Orchestras (Aurora Orchestra, BBC Concert Orchestra, Chineke! Orchestra and National Youth Orchestra of Great Britain).

Gigs & Contemporary Music at Southbank Centre

Southbank Centre delivers a year-round programme of more than 200 gigs and contemporary music performances across its three main venues - Royal Festival Hall, Queen Elizabeth Hall and Purcell Room - its public spaces and pop-up stages. The annual and award-winning *Meltdown* festival launched in 1993 and is the longest-running artist-curated music festival in the world, each year inviting a different cultural figure to act as curator. Previous curators include David Bowie, Yoko Ono, M.I.A and in 2019 Nile Rodgers. As well as fifty years of presenting global stars such as Frank Sinatra, Joni Mitchell, Jeff Buckley, Grace Jones, Nina Simone, Pink Floyd, The Cure and Nine Inch Nails, it gives a stage to the best rising talent each Friday for free in its *futuretense* series. The monthly club night *Concrete Lates* showcases underrepresented talent in international underground electronic music. And its outdoor summer stages entertain thousands of members of the public every year for free.
