With this programme, we continue to celebrate classical music in all its forms, with leading artists and ensembles from the UK and around the world.

Our Resident Orchestras are an integral part of our programme, and we are now producing more collaborations with them than ever before. Together with the London Philharmonic Orchestra, London Sinfonietta, Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment and Philharmonia Orchestra, and the recent additions of Aurora Orchestra and Chineke! Orchestra, we are presenting the best in classical music, as well as embracing new approaches to how we do so.

In collaboration with our Resident Orchestras, we champion pioneering artists in our *Artist Residencies*. For Spring/Summer 2023, we welcome pianist Alice Sara Ott as the latest addition, and continue to highlight the work of cellist Abel Selaocoe, violinist Daniel Pioro, ensemble Manchester Collective and cellist Sheku Kanneh-Mason, who began their residencies earlier in the year.

We are joined by incomparable orchestras from across the globe, including the Mahler Chamber Orchestra with Mitsuko Uchida, and Budapest Festival Orchestra. We also welcome major keyboard and chamber music stars including Mahan Esfahani, Pierre-Laurent Aimard and Anne-Sophie Mutter, and Kristian Bezuidenhout performs with the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment.

In our *Contemporary Edit*, Abel Selaocoe and Seckou Keita are joined by the Chineke! Orchestra to present a work cocommissioned by the Southbank Centre; the London Sinfonietta celebrates the work of their esteemed collaborator Sir Harrison Birtwistle; the London Philharmonic Orchestra presents the UK premiere of Heiner Goebbels' extraordinary *A House of Call*; and the Philharmonia Orchestra amplifies 21st-century works in their free *Music of Today* events.

Our Alternative Experiences strand takes us to Printworks London, where Aurora Orchestra reimagines Beethoven's Fifth in an immersive event. We've got more lively performances for music-lovers of all ages in our family events, including multimedia projects that bring music to magical life.

We are thrilled to present such an incredible range of global artists in our Spring/Summer programme, and look forward to welcoming you to our spaces – and beyond – to see them perform.

We are proud to be home to six Resident Orchestras: Aurora Orchestra, Chineke! Orchestra, London Philharmonic Orchestra, London Sinfonietta, Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment and Philharmonia Orchestra.

Together, we strive to present the best in classical music, extend the boundaries of the genre, champion new thinking and reflect our changing society.



Aurora Orchestra

Since its launch in 2005, Aurora Orchestra has established itself among Europe's leading chamber orchestras, and is known for adventurous presentation and collaboration across art forms. Under Principal Conductor Nicholas Collon, Aurora has overturned preconceptions about what an orchestra should and can do on the concert platform – and off the concert platform, as the orchestra demonstrates with its immersive Beethoven experience, taking place at former printing plant Printworks London in March.



Chineke! Orchestra

Founded in 2015 by Chi-chi Nwanoku OBE, and launched in our Queen Elizabeth Hall, the Chineke! Orchestra is Europe's first majority Black and ethnically diverse orchestra. Its motto is: 'Championing change and celebrating diversity in classical music'. The ensemble performs standard orchestral repertoire along with the works of Black and ethnically diverse composers both past and present. In Spring/Summer 2023, they present music by Samuel Coleridge-Taylor, Stewart Goodyear, Florence Price and Carlos Simon.

London Philharmonic Orchestra

The London Philharmonic Orchestra is recognised today as one of the finest orchestras on the international stage. The orchestra was founded in 1932 and has been performing at the Royal Festival Hall since it opened in 1951, becoming a Resident Orchestra in 1992. Throughout its 2022/23 season, the London Philharmonic Orchestra explores what we mean by 'home' through the theme A place to call home, presenting works including the UK premiere of Heiner Goebbels' immersive spectacle A House of Call.



Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment

The Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment makes old music new, using period instruments and techniques not in an attempt to recreate the past, but to give audiences an experience that is closer to what a composer might have imagined. The current season, Songs of Travel, explores the Enlightenment fascination with composers' journeys of discovery in real and imagined landscapes, via music by Handel and Mozart. Also see a new side to Gilbert & Sullivan's Princess Ida, or Castle Adamant with Louise Alder in the title role.



London Sinfonietta

The London Sinfonietta is one of the world's finest contemporary music ensembles, with a reputation built on cutting-edge programming and virtuosic performances. Founded in 1968, the ensemble (called 'a national treasure' by composer Steve Reich) has a commitment to new music that has seen it commission more than 450 works, and premiere hundreds more. It opens Spring/Summer 2023 with a concert that pays tribute to one of its longest-standing collaborators, the late Sir Harrison Birtwistle, showcasing his ingenious and varied works.



Philharmonia Orchestra

The Philharmonia creates thrilling experiences in music, with Santtu-Matias Rouvali at the helm as Principal Conductor. This season, he conducts works by Mahler, Rachmaninov, Shostakovich and more. The Philharmonia's Featured Artist for 2022/23 is cellist Sheku Kanneh-Mason – also one of our Resident Artists for Spring/Summer. He joins the orchestra in Ernest Bloch's *Schelomo* and, in the Philharmonia's season finale, Beethoven's Triple Concerto with Nicola Benedetti (violin) and Benjamin Grosvenor (piano).

Showcasing the most forward-thinking and boundary-pushing developments in classical music today, our *Contemporary Edit* highlights artists who are changing the landscape of the genre. The series features ambitious events from many of our Resident Orchestras and Resident Artists.


The London Sinfonietta delves into the extraordinary work of one of its closest collaborators: the late, great Sir Harrison Birtwistle, and later features the work of voices from the 21st century. Meanwhile, Resident Artist Daniel Pioro demonstrates classical music's breadth and evolution via two great works that are rarely performed side by side. The Philharmonia Orchestra's free *Music* of *Today* events continue, focusing on works by Bryce Dessner and Anna Clyne, as well as composers from their Academy. And the London Philharmonic Orchestra premieres a *Finnegans Wake*-inspired work by Heiner Goebbels that takes us on an evening-long adventure.

Further premieres are brought to our halls by Resident Artist Manchester Collective, which returns with the London premiere of Alice Zawadzki's dark fairy tale Bag of Bones, and collaborates with guitarist Sean Shibe for the first time in an experimental event that features new works by Kelly Moran and Emily Hall.

Aurora Orchestra takes us inside Beethoven and premieres new work by Héloïse Werner, and the Southbank Centre presents Conor Mitchell's politically charged opera *Abomination: A DUP Opera*. Major new commissions by the Southbank Centre include a work by Daniel Pioro, Valgeir Sigurðsson and Liam Byrne, fusing the ancient and the contemporary. Abel Selaocoe, Seckou Keita and Chineke! Orchestra also perform a new work, co-commissioned by the Southbank Centre and written by and for Selaocoe and Keita.

CHAMBER MUSIC

Our Resident Artists take centre stage in our chamber music concerts, joined by friends and collaborators for intimate performances of both cherished favourites and experimental projects that showcase their brilliance and creativity.

As both Southbank Centre Resident Artist and Philharmonia Orchestra Featured Artist, Sheku Kanneh-Mason is accompanied by friends from the Philharmonia in a lavish programme of music for string ensemble, including Kanneh-Mason's own arrangements of Bach.

Resident Artist Alice Sara Ott performs two great masterpieces of the chamber repertoire: Schubert's *Trout* Quintet, interspersed with joyful bucolic songs by Beethoven, Schubert and Vaughan Williams, and Messiaen's extraordinary *Quartet for the End of Time*, which was composed in a prisoner-of-war camp in eastern Germany.

KEYBOARD MUSIC

Organ, harpsichord, fortepiano or grand: whatever form the keyboard takes, it holds a special place at the heart of classical music thanks to its remarkable versatility and range. During our Spring/Summer 2023 programme, we welcome some of its greatest exponents to our halls.



On Wednesday 5 April, we celebrate some of the many facets of the keyboard. The peerless Mitsuko Uchida performs the mighty trilogy of Beethoven's final piano sonatas; and Mahan Esfahani pairs Renaissance harpsichord music with contemporary works in an intimate late-night concert.

We put our magnificent Royal Festival Hall organ through its paces, taking full advantage of the power of its 7,866 pipes. Robert Quinney devotes a recital to music by JS Bach, with works ranging from the intimate to the gigantic, and Olivier Latry plays transcriptions of some of the best-loved moments of Wagner's musical dramas alongside major works for the organ from Latry's native France.

More brilliance on the keys comes from Pierre-Laurent Aimard with a programme of fantasies, giving us a tour of this expressive form through works by composers including Mozart, Beethoven and George Benjamin. And if one piano just isn't enough? In May, Pavel Kolesnikov and Samson Tsoy join forces for an electrifying evening of Russian dances.

INTERNATIONAL ORCHESTRAS

See the world's greatest symphony orchestras, artists and ensembles here in the heart of London at our historic venues. Since the Royal Festival Hall was inaugurated in 1951, we have built international connections that make us the premier venue for international orchestras visiting the UK.



With revered pianist Mitsuko Uchida, the Mahler Chamber Orchestra – a unique ensemble of 45 musicians from 20 countries – continues its flagship project centred on Mozart's piano concertos. In this concert, two late Mozart concertos are accompanied by Schoenberg's Chamber Symphony No.1, which was heralded by the composer himself as a 'true turning point' in his style.

Mahler's Ninth Symphony is revealed in all of its glory by the Budapest Festival Orchestra. Written at the very end of the composer's life, this sublime – at times heartbreaking – work has been interpreted as Mahler's final farewell: an expression of tenderness towards life itself, and grief in the knowledge of our mortality.

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
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

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
